Assignments

- There will be a few assignments throughout the semester
- These will be small and mainly involve setting up tools and practicing a variety of development techniques

Development Log

- Each team will be responsible for maintaining a development log
- The dev log will track the current project status
 - What was accomplished during each sprint
 - What will happen during the next sprint
- Allows us to track how the project evolves over the semester
- Note: each "sprint" will be a one-week cycle/iteration

Weekly Standup

- Your team will meet with the instructor once per week.
- Your grade for each meeting is based on whether you accomplished the tasks you set out to do during the last meeting
 - One of the hardest things in software development is estimating how long things will take
 - Note: your 2 lowest standup scores will be dropped
- Don't get blocked! If you run into trouble, your teammates and the course staff can help.

Presentations

- You'll present your work to the class twice
 - Once as a progress update in the middle of the semester
 - Once at the end of the semester to show your final product
- Presentations will be peer reviewed and also reviewed by the course staff
 - We look for improvement between the progress update and final presentation

Final Deliverables

- You'll turn in the project and demo it with the course instructor
- Your final grade will be based on how well you were able to meet your goals for the semester
- Individual contributions will be graded as well
- The project sponsor will also sign off and evaluate your work

Course Structure

- Once we reach a steady state (groups set up, initial assignments done, projects selected), there will be a lot of flexibility on attendance
- You will check in with the instructor during a weekly standup meeting (15-20 minutes) and also meet with the project sponsor once per week.
